COVINGTON, Ga. -Albert J. Saunders Jr., 78, of Covington, Ga., and formerly of Mason City, died Tuesday (May 25, 2010) at Abbey Hospice in Social Circle, Ga.

Funeral Mass will be held at 10:30 a.m. Friday, June 4, 2010, at St. Joseph's Catholic Church, 302 Fifth St. S.E., Mason City, with Monsignor Joseph J. Slepicka and the Rev. Craig E. Steimel officiating. Interment will be held in the Elmwood-St. Joseph Cemetery with military honors performed by the Mason City Veterans Memorial Association.

Visitation will be held from 5 to 7 p.m. Thursday at the Major Erickson Funeral Home, 111 N. Pennsylvania Ave., with a scriptural wake service at 7 p.m.

In lieu of flowers, memorials may be directed to St. Joseph's Catholic Church.

Al was born June 22, 1931, in Mason City, the son of Albert Sr. and Edna (McAlister) Saunders. He attended St. Joseph's Catholic Grade School, Roosevelt Junior High and Mason City High School. He then

attended Mason City Junior College, graduating in 1951. Al then attended the University of Iowa for a year until his enlistment in the U.S. Navy. While in the Navy he married Dorothy Osby and they proceeded to raise a family.

After the service he returned to the University of Iowa for a short period of time, then attended Parsons College in Fairfield, Iowa, and graduated in 1960.

During the next several years he lived primarily in California and the Far East, working for the U.S. Department of Defense as a security professional at the Merrimac Naval Air Station in San Diego. He was transferred to the Long Beach Shipyard, Port of Long Beach. At this stage of his life, he became divorced and in subsequent years married Mary Lou Fruin. Al then worked numerous places around the world in charge of naval base security while employed with the U.S. government. Al and Mary Lou eventually moved back to the States and Al retired from the U.S. Government.

He lived a short while in Missouri, Mason City and then Marble Rock, where he served as the town's first African-American mayor in 1976. Al and Mary Lou then moved to Covington, Ga., where he and a business partner established an insurance agency and at one time employed 17 different independent insurance agents.

Al will be dearly missed by all who knew and loved him. Al is survived by his wife, Mary Lou Saunders; daughters, Allanne Saunders and Rhonda Henry; sons, Robert, Errol and Rodney Saunders; sister, Greta Lou Jeffries; brothers, Philip T. Saunders and Dr. Meredith R. Saunders; eight grandchildren, seven great-grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Paul was born May 7, 1934, in Marble Rock to George and Emma (Hesse) Tegtmeier. He graduated from Marble Rock High School in 1954. On Oct. 27, 1957, Paul married Maxine Mae Trettin at Rock

Creek Lutheran Church, west of Osage. To this union were born three sons, Daniel, Rick and Bill. Paul and Maxine started their lives in the Burchinal area and then moved to Rudd. They later moved to a farm south of Rudd, then to several homes in Rockford, before moving for the last time in 1964 to their current home.

Paul served his country in the Marine Corps from June 1954 until his honorable discharge in June 1956. He served in Korea and for a short time in Japan. His work life led him from 12 years at the Oliver plant in Charles City to working at Decker Meat Packing Plant in Mason City, then becoming a millwright and concrete finisher on Interstate 35. His final work was at Con Agra in the sliced bacon department. After work and weekends he worked with his sons and brothers dismantling barns and using the lumber for other projects, painting houses and farm buildings. Most nights during the week he would return home to take Maxine and the boys fishing at Rock Creek. Often, after the boys went to bed they could hear the clink and ring of Paul playing horseshoes with friends. One of his most favorite pastimes was playing cribbage and 500 with his family and friends.

During a time while laid off from work, he and Jerry Boehmer played cribbage until the first one won 1,000 games. It took "all winter." His personalized license plate "Ole Grump" belied his true soft side. He served on the Rockford Volunteer Fire Department for 14 years and the Rockford Cemetery Board.

Over the years Paul enjoyed fishing, wood working, collecting die-cast tractors, watching the Chicago Cubs and Minnesota Vikings and his coffee time with his Rockford "buddies."

God Is With Us in Hard Times

[Genesis 41:14-44](#)

The Bible is relevant for every situation. Although the details of our circumstances probably differ from those described in Scripture, God's Word still applies.

From the life of Joseph, we get a glimpse of what it means to have God with us in hard times. First of all, the young man's faith strengthened, helping him place loyalty to the Lord above his personal welfare. For example, when Potiphar's wife attempted to seduce Joseph, he refused, saying he would not sin against God (Gen. 39:9).

Second, the Lord's presence meant that Joseph prospered right where he was—as a slave in Potiphar's house and as a prisoner in a foreign jail. In both situations, those in charge recognized God's favor was upon Joseph. So they gave him great responsibility and authority (vv. 3-4, 21-22).

Third, during times of suffering, Joseph gained invaluable life lessons that prepared him for the future. As a slave and prisoner, Joseph learned ways to handle responsibility, the details of Egyptian culture, and the importance of keeping God first. An additional blessing was the opportunity to be a witness to the Lord's power and sufficiency. When brought before Pharaoh to interpret his dream, Joseph said he could not do it but testified that God could (41:16). We can see our faith grow by relying on our heavenly Father the way Joseph did. When we give God His rightful place in our lives as Lord, His presence will strengthen us to resist temptation. Then we, too, will be equipped to do kingdom work and ready to proclaim His greatness to those around us.

The Greatness of God

When you think of God, what comes to mind? Often, people view Him in the way that best fits their particular need or situation. For example, a person who struggles with guilt might focus on the Lord's forgiveness or holiness. And someone with a thirst for justice might dwell on the Almighty's righteousness.

The truth is, His character encompasses far more than we could ever comprehend or try to explain. I would never attempt to summarize such an awesome God in this devotion. At the same time, however, it is important to look at Scripture in order to gain an accurate a picture of the One we worship. Today we will focus on one attribute: His greatness. Our passage tells us that God is greater than creation (v. 12), for it was by His hands that everything we see came into being. He is higher than the nations or any idol fashioned by the finest craftsman (vv. 18-20). In fact, He is above the world and all mankind (vv. 22-23), surpassing even the heavens and all galaxies.

Our Father's thoughts and ways are far grander than our own (Is. 55:9)—and lofty compared with what we can understand. Psalm 93:1 states, "The LORD reigns, He is clothed with majesty; the LORD has clothed and girded Himself with strength."

Consider the awesome God we serve. He truly is worthy of our praise. As we grasp even a fraction of His greatness, our response should be one of humble worship. After all, who are we that a God like this would desire our friendship—so much so that He sent His Son to die for our sins?



Grilled "Baked" Potatoes

- 4 Russet Potatoes
- 1 Tbsp. oil
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup Sour Cream
- 1/2 cup Shurfresh Shredded Cheddar Cheese
